Why Teach Your Child About 9-1-1?

9-1-1 is a vital part of the emergency response system. If an emergency situation exists and the only person who is able to call 9-1-1 is a child, that child's knowledge of 9-1-1 and how to use the phone and system can be the key to getting the help that is needed. Does your child know how to and when to call 9-1-1?

What Your Child Should Know

- Teach your child their last name, their parent's name, and their home address and phone number. This information should also be listed near the phone.
- Teach your child the name of your employer and the phone number.
- Help your child understand **WHEN** they should call 9-1-1.
- Let your child know not to be afraid to call 9-1-1 if there is any doubt as to whether they should.
- Teach your child to dial <u>"Nine, One, One"</u> and never teach them, <u>"Nine Eleven"</u>, this might confuse the child and they may look for the number eleven on the phone.
- Make sure your child can reach at least one of the phones in your house and they know how to use it.
- Discuss with your child any situations that may be unique to them. This could include an elderly live-in relative; younger sibling or other unique factor that the child might encounter.
- They should know to always call from a safe location. If the house is on fire, get out and call from a nearby phone.

When to Dial 9-1-1


9-1-1 is the phone number to call when you need help from police, fire, or an ambulance.

These situations can include but are not limited to:

- Get help for someone who is hurt
- If you smell smoke or see fire
- If someone is hurting you
- If you are not sure if you should call 9-1-1 and there are no adults nearby to ask

How to Dial 9-1-1

- Pick up the phone and listen for a dial tone
- Push the "9" button, push the "1" button and then push the "1" button again
- Wait for the 9-1-1 operator to answer the call



What to do When 9-1-1 Answers

- The 9-1-1 operator will ask you questions to find out what type of help you need. What is your <u>location</u>? What is your <u>phone number</u>? <u>What is the emergency</u>? What is your <u>name</u>?
- Remember to <u>stay calm</u> and <u>speak slowly</u>.
- Tell the 9-1-1 operator what's wrong and where you need help.
- Speak up loud and clear when being asked questions.
- Stay on the phone until the 9-1-1 operator tells you it's ok to hang up.

What not to do When Calling 9-1-1

- If you call by mistake, stay on the line and tell the 9-1-1 operator that you dialed wrong.
- Do not call 9-1-1 as a joke or a prank. You can get into serious trouble. More importantly, you can delay someone else getting the help they need in an emergency.

9-1-1 DO's and DON'Ts

- 9-1-1 is for police, fire and medical
- If you call 9-1-1, don't hang up
- Don't call 9-1-1 for jokes or prank calls
- A deactivated cell phone with power can still call 9-1-1
- When you call 9-1-1, pay attention to the questions you are being asked
- Stay calm and speak clearly
- Stay on the line until you are told it is okay to hang up
